# **OUR MEMBERS**

- 46 individuals supported
- members aged 19 65
- evenly split between male + female
- most common disabilities: ADHD, Autism + Down syndrome
- most from Oakland County



# **OUR IMPACT**

- 70% living independently
- 74% working competitive jobs



# **OUR PROGRAMS**



- 300+ activities offered
- 800+ hours of support provided
- 1 session of Independence Prep
- 1 family consulting session

# OUR VISION FOR THE FUTURE

- for teens + young adults
- quarterly overnight independent living experiences

INDEPENDENCE PREP



- for students who have completed high school
- two-year residential 'college-like' independent living training program

INDEPENDENCE COLLEGE



- affordable + inclusive apartment homes
- lifelong independent living support + amenities on-site

INDEPENDENCE VILLAGE



# **OUR PROGRESS**

- launched Independence Prep
- launched one-on-one family consulting
- crafted curriculum for Independence College
- crafted assessments for future programs
- evaluated one location for *Independence Village*
- created wish list of services for Independence Village





# **OUR FINANCES**

- FY 21 revenue: \$577K (49% contributed, 40% earned, 11% PPP)
- FY 21 expenses: \$491K (79% program, 13% fundraising, 8% administration)
- 6.5 months of expenses in reserve fund at end of FY 21
- received \$122K in COVID-19 Payroll Protection Program funds
- applied for \$58K in COVID-19 Employee Retention Credits

# OUR STAFF + BOARD

- will begin hiring for Head of Education soon
- recruiting 1 3 more board members



# **OUR FINANCES**

- FY 22 (July 2021 June 2022) budgeted revenue: \$511K
- FY 22 budgeted expenses: \$632K
- FY 22 budgeted investment from reserves: \$121K
- trending better than budget at halfway mark:
  - \$232K in revenue (budget of \$269K)
  - \$279K in expenses (budget of \$354K)
  - \$45K invested from reserves (budget of \$84K)

# OUR COMMITMENT TO EQUITY

- DEI Working Group
- conversations with community groups
- learning opportunities for members, staff + board
- diversifying member, staff + board applicant pools
  - 100% of board candidates interviewed
  - 66% of member applicants
